Commencement of White Swan Sunday School and Fellowship, Later Mt Roskill Baptist Church

The following except is taken from the White Swan Baptist Service Record Book, and was written in July 1952:

In the year 1923, Mr. Enoch Wood, who lived in Mt Albert Road, when driving through the May Road, Richardson Road, and White Swan Road area, noticed a number of children playing in the roads. When he attended Edendale Sunday School, he mentioned to the Superintendent, and to others, that he would like to see something done in that area, and if anyone was willing to try and start a Sunday School he would find, and give, an organ for the work.

During September of that year (1923), Mr Ross Penmen and Mr Scampton from Edendale (Sandringham) canvassed the area and obtained permission from Mrs Patterson Senior of Richardson Road to hold Sunday School in her front room. Mr Ross Penman commenced morning Sunday School early in October, 1923.

Services started in January, 6th 1924 and were held weekly in Mrs Patterson's house. A meeting of residents was held and a couple of collection books taken to gather funds towards a building.

A section was looked for in 1924 and Mr George Morgan, whose mother lived in Richardson Road, was prevailed upon to give the section which our building now occupies. Mr Morgan made two conditions. Firstly, an undertaking by one another to give the first £50 to start a building fund. This was arranged. Secondly, title would be given on the undertaking that the services would be held regularly for ten years. Honouring this undertaking, services have been held practically every Sunday since. Beryl Butler's Apple Cake

The following is a 'world famous at Mt Roskill Baptist Church' recipe taken from the 75th Anniversary Cookbook, 1998.

Ingredients 3 large apples 3/4 cup sugar 1 & 1/2 cups flour 1 tsp baking soda 1 tsp cinnamon 1 tsp mixed spice 125g butter 1 egg (beaten) 1/2 cup of chopped dates (optional) 1/2 cup of walnuts (optional)

Directions

Pre-heat oven to 180° C. Line a 20cm cake time with baking paper. Peel, core and coarsely chop the apples. Combine butter, sugar and egg. Sift dry ingredients into a mixing bowl. Add the liquid ingredients, walnuts, dates, then apples.

Combine well. Don't worry if there looks to be more apple than anything else! Bake for approximately 50 mins until a skewer inserted in the middle is clean. Sprinkle with icing sugar. Makes a good pudding too when served

with custard or cream.

Family of Nations; Followers of Jesus

Mt Roskill is known as the leading multiethnic suburb in Tamaki Makaurau (Auckland). Our local schools are evidence, and why should our local churches be any different?

Some churches have chosen to focus on a specific culture, be it Pacifica, African or Asian. This is particularly beneficial for first-generation immigrants, but creates challenges for their second and third generations. In contrast, Mt Roskill Baptist Church has chosen to gather as a Family of Nations. We've had to rethink our traditional ways of the church and cultivate an acceptance of other ethnicities and cultures. Our common language remains English, for pragmatic reasons, but we rejoice in the sound of multiple languages and cultures among us. We appreciate and celebrate this diversity, learning to converse and laugh together. Our vision is gradually taking shape, although we have much to learn and improve.

A Heart For Mission

18 October 1949- a group gathered to decide whether the White Swan Sunday School could become a Baptist fellowship... and after 26 years with a "mission status" they agreed to become a Baptist Church. This was an exciting step for the gathered locals, an acknowledgment of our mission roots. Mt Roskill Baptist was established as a community outreach and over the past 100 years has shared the love of Jesus locally and further afield. In fact, our first missionary sent overseas was Iris Cook. She was with the Christian Literature Crusade in Antigua and Barbuda, West Indies. She graduated from the Bible College of NZ in 1958. There are many references in AGM reports about "our missionary". Since Iris left NZ, there are at least 101 people who have served locally and overseas in a missional capacity (not including those who served on diaconates, elderships and leadership team or with our many years of Boys and Girls Brigade, Sunday School and many other voluntary roles).

The vibrancy and richness of our church community is strengthened as we partner with those in mission. Praying for them, supporting them financially and welcoming those who newly arrive in NZ.

The countries and places we have served in include; Tanzania, Ethiopia, Kenya and West Africa, South Korea, West Indies, India, Bangladesh, Japan, China, Cambodia, Thailand, Singapore, Papua New Guinea, the Pacific Islands and United Kingdom. Some of our people serve overseas from NZ and others are pastoring around Aotearoa. We know that God has led, shaped, blessed, refined and honed many people for His glory in those places. It is true that our suburb is multi-ethnic and people are coming to us, that is God's plan to make sure all will know about the glorious hope He has for them - but it is still His plan to send us out overseas to reach the most unreached places in our world.
